


Easy Freezies

Breath Freshening Minty Freezies

- 1 cup of plain or Greek yogurt
- Small handful of fresh parsley leaves
- Small handful of fresh mint leaves

Use blender until herbs are spread evenly through mixture. Add a splash of water, if desired, to thin the mixture for easier pouring. Fill ice cube trays and pop in the freezer until solid.



Coconut Drops for a Shiny Coat

- 1 cup of organic coconut oil
- 1 handful of berries
- 1 teaspoon of honey

Soften coconut oil in a bowl placed over a pan of boiled water. Shape into bite-sized balls and freeze on a tray until hardened. Can be stored in refrigerator as coconut oil will stay hard without freezing.



Fruity "Pupsicle"

- 1½ cups of strawberries
- 2 bananas
- ½ cup coconut oil
- Dog biscuits
- A splash of water
- Cupcake liners or silicone cups



Blend strawberries and bananas together until smooth. Melt coconut oil and stir together with fruity mixture until it has a texture like soft ice cream. If it's too thick, add a little water. Add the mixture to your cups and cover with cling wrap. Make a hole in the middle of the cling film with a knife and push a dog biscuit through. This helps keep the biscuit in an upright position. Pop them in the freezer.

Chicken Stock and Parsley Freezies

- 2 cups reduced-sodium chicken stock
- Small handful of parsley

Chop parsley finely and stir into the chicken stock. Pour the mixture into ice cube trays and pop them in the freezer. Serve on their own or add one to your dog's water bowl to add flavor. Parsley helps keep breath fresh.



Kong Freezies

Frozen Kongs can offer hours of entertainment for our dogs. Mix or blend ingredients together, fill up your Kong and freeze until solid. Here are just a few variations.

Ingredients:

- 1 cup of boiled potato
- ½ cup of plain cottage cheese
- ½ cup of grated low-fat cheese

Ingredients:

- 1 banana
- 1 cup of plain or Greek yogurt
- 1 teaspoon of honey

Ingredients:

- 1 cup of cooked sweet potato
- 1 Handful of shredded, boiled chicken
- 1 Handful of cooked carrots
- 2 tablespoons of yogurt

Ingredients:

- 1 cup of cottage cheese
- 1 cup of natural peanut butter (Xylitol-free)
- 1 teaspoon of honey



Celebrate With Cake!

Who doesn't love birthday cake? This is only one of the many recipes for dog cakes and treats found at PersonalCreations.com.



Cake ingredients

- 1 cup almond flour
- ½ cup sweet potato puree
- ½ cup shredded carrots
- 2 tablespoons honey
- 3 tablespoons melted coconut oil
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- ¼ cup water

Frosting ingredients

- ¼ cup plain nonfat yogurt
- ¼ cup sweet potato puree
- Shredded carrots (optional)

Directions

1. Preheat oven to 350°F.
2. Mix together honey, coconut oil and sweet potato puree. Add almond flour, baking powder and water, then stir in carrots.
3. Grease pan with coconut oil. Add batter and bake for 20-25 minutes, until the center is firm.
4. After the cake cools, top with sweet potato puree, yogurt and shredded carrots.

The Dog Days of Summer



The Dog Days of Summer describes the most oppressive period of summer. But where did the term come from? And what does it have to do with dogs?

The phrase is actually a reference to the fact that, during this time, the Sun occupies the same region of the sky as Sirius, the brightest star visible from any part of Earth and part of the constellation Canis

Major, the Greater Dog. This is why Sirius is sometimes called the Dog Star.

In mid-summer, Sirius rises and sets with the Sun and because the star is so bright, the ancient Romans believed it actually gave off heat and added to the Sun's warmth, accounting for the long stretch of sultry weather. They referred to this time as *diēs caniculāres*, or "dog days."

Thus, the term Dog Days of Summer came to mean the 20 days before and 20 days after this alignment of Sirius with the Sun. While this period usually *is* the hottest stretch of summer, the heat is not due to any added radiation from Sirius, regardless of its brightness.
